A Letter from Cameron O'Riley

March 15, 2014

Dear Father Herring, Senior Warden Kirkland, and Members of the Vestry,


Hints of spring are finally coming forth here on the mountain. The daffodils are in bloom, and there are new leaf buds on the rose bush outside my door. New life is coming to Sewanee, and winter will soon be at bay until next year. The pace and vigor of this my second semester of seminary has been an enjoyable experience. Classes are informative and challenging, and I am amazed by the wealth of knowledge with which I am surrounded. I feel that I have found a work/ study schedule that is working well. The balance at times may be tenuous, but it is manageable. I actually look forward to classes, attending guest lectures, and worshiping together. I have found attending the daily office within community to be spiritually fulfilling, the effects of which are evident in my personal communication with God, and interactions with others. On Sundays, I have been visiting churches in the Huntsville and Nashville area with which I will seek to apply for field education in the fall; much like the capacity in which Kemper Anderson is serving with you now. On one such visit, I met the Rev. Andy Anderson and learned he, too, had been a seminarian sponsored by St. Peter's Rome. It was such a joyful surprise to meet him. There is a potential opportunity to engage in a new program entitled "Be the Change Alabama," and I look forward to learning more as its foundation is developed. On Ash Wednesday, we had a Quiet Day here at Sewanee. It was good to have a day to be reflective and in prayer.

If I were to use one word to describe the past year, from gaining postulancy, to conducting seminary visits, and ultimately moving and beginning classes, I would say transition. It has been a journey filled with changes from a former way of being and living. I have learned what it means to be in community, to rely on others, and to be a willing recipient of grace. I have been strengthened by God's presence in my life and in the lives of those with whom I work and study and pray each day. As my familiarity and understanding have increased, I am awed by all that God has done in my life and in the lives of others. I have gained confidence as a new rhythm of life has begun to emerge. Through these experiences I have mentioned, I feel I have been strengthened for ministry and I look forward to growing in faith and knowledge of Christ through the following two years.

Amazingly, there are only six weeks of classes left between now and the end of the school year. It hardly seems possible. Time has certainly sped up. Shortly after the close of this semester, I will be leaving for Naples, Florida where I will be participating in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) under the supervision of NCH Healthcare June 2- August 8. It is my sincere desire to come and worship with you before my departure. Through your prayers and financial assistance, you have been my support and encouragement. For this, I am grateful.

George E. Home, Jr. A Fisher of Men

For 22 years, a secret has been kept in the chapel. The "Call of Peter" window was dedicated and given in thanksgiving on June, 28, 1992, Ginger, moved to but the donor of the window and the person honored by the window were unknown until the death of the Reverend George E. Home Jr. on August 12, 2013. At that time, George's family revealed that his wife, Iane, had commissioned the Lyn Hovey Studios in Boston to design the window in her husband's honor. How appropriate it is that the tribute to him comes in the form of St. Peter, the beloved apostle for whom this church is named.

The window is inscribed with the words, "Follow me and I will make you Fishers of Men." Christ's hand is outstretched to the two brothers. Peter and Andrew, fishing on the Sea of Galilee. At the top of the window is the inverted cross of St. Peter, and at the base, is a ship that is sailing through a rainbow. Shells, water, and the rainbow are all symbols of rebirth and the journey to Christ through Baptism. The ship, which is traveling through perilous waters, represents the church as the source of strength when we are struggling along the path and are plagued by doubt or temptation. These symbols seem

He was ordained as a Perpetual Dean in the Episcopal Church in 1960, sold the Home Equipment Company to enter Seminary, and was ordained into the priesthood and their daughter, All the family mem- of the Episcopal Church at St. Peter's in 1965.

"Fishers of Men" are called to work within the church, but often their ministry extends beyond its boundaries. George had the gift of inspiring people to build communities and had that experience as the rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Covington, GA; St. Dunstan's Church, Atlanta, GA; and the Church of the Transfiguration, Rome, GA. During those years, his energy motivated the move of St. Dunstan's to its permanent space on Garmon Road, and he was instrumental in building the Church of the Transfiguration in Rome. One of his best gifts, however, was bringing people together and building the Body of Christ in his communities as well as in his parishes.

His daughter, Ginger Home Cubellis, noted that her father's "call to the ministry turned out to be a call to counseling." He acted as a liaison between the black and white communities in Covington during integration, started the first AA group there, continued his counseling with the AA groups in Atlanta and Rome, helped stroke patients find their best selves, and also did individual and family counseling to everyone who wanted his help. With the laying on of the hands of Bishop Randolph Claiborne in 1965 and his prayer asking God's help for George E. Home Jr. to "be a faithful pastor, a patient teacher, and a wise councilor" (BCP 534), the Reverend George E. Home followed the tradition of Peter—as a fisher of men.

Safety Concerns lead to Sidewalk Closure at Corner of 1st Street and 4th Avenue

It would be very hard to miss the yellow tape and saw horses at the corner of East First Street and Fourth Avenue nor the open side door to St. Peter's sanctuary. The crumbling shape of the top of the bell tower is of some concern as pieces of rock and mortar are falling to the side walk quite frequently. As a precaution for the public as well as parishioners, a decision was made to block off that section of the sidewalk.

Stephen Smith, vestry property chair, met with Kirk Milam, public works director for the city of Rome, who helped block off the affected areas. He has also communicated with Chris Dawkins of Beech Consulting about the problem. Beech Consulting was recommended by St. Peter's insurance carrier, Church Insurance Company of Vermont. Mr. Dawkins viewed photographs of the tower and sent a report recommending this action.

The vestry and building committee are actively searching for solution to resolve the situation as quickly as possible. In the meantime, parishioners are asked to use the chapel entrance and the entrance to Daniel Hall to get to the nave and avoid coming around the corner to the front steps.
