"It's good news, all good news," said Nancy Knight, chair of the building committee at St. Peter's as she opened a called vestry meeting on Tuesday, April 29. The good news she brought was the committee's recommendation of a General Contractor to hire for our upcoming renovation project. The further good news was the bid is within the funds raised by the Capital Campaign Committee so none of the proposed renovation items will have to be forfeited because of expense. (Bring on that elevator!)

Even more exciting is that we can continue to "worship at home." While construction takes place in the sanctuary and chapel, we will worship in Daniel Hall. Upon completion of those areas, we will move back into the sanctuary and turn over Daniel Hall to the contractor. Logistics, time lines, etc. are all being ironed out, and as soon as more details become available, the Parish will be updated. A web page dedicated to the renovation will be on our website soon. There you will be able to follow the progress and get the latest information.

After discussion of the bid, the members of the vestry unanimously voted to go with the building committee's recommendations. The local firm of Pinson's Inc. will handle our renovation. The committee is excited to be able to work with a company of Pinson's caliber. Construction at St. Peter's will begin within the next two weeks.

Many thanks to Nancy Knight for providing "Letters" with this information as soon as everything was finalized.

What do we Mean by Resurrection? A Reflection on Eastertide

Eastertide

Eastertide is here. From now until Pentecost, our liturgies will be saturated with the motif of resurrection. Well they should be, since it is impossible to do justice to resurrection on Easter alone. It is a very good idea for all of us to exercise curiosity about issues underlying Easter. Let's have a look at a major one.

We need to ask ourselves if the Gospel affirms a physical resurrection. We often hear it said that "I can accept that Jesus' spirit is alive, but I cannot believe that he rose physically from the dead." This thought is often accompanied by a sentiment that "I'm much more spiritual than religious. I don't care much for institutional religion."

If we take the New Testament seriously, we will have no difficulty giving short shrift to a purely spiritual resurrection. The first Christians were convinced that the risen Christ had encountered them not as a spirit, but as someone embodied. When Judaism had looked forward to the Age to Come, it expected a physical resurrection. Paul's elaborate seed imagery in First Corinthians is about the physicality of resurrection.

It is important to ask ourselves what we imagine when we speak of physical resurrection. Jesus' resurrection body was in some important ways different from the body that died on the cross. Mary Magdalene did not recognize him immediately early Easter morning. Both John and Luke write of one whose resurrection body is not subject to the same limits that we take for granted. The risen Jesus is embodied, but in a way that makes him both discontinuous and continuous with us. We might note that none of his enemies noticed him. Only those already in some measure committed to him were witnesses to his resurrection.

It is worth noting that today's best physicists admit that they are far from clear about what matter is. Most people are aware that the tiniest bits of matter contain enormous energy. $E=MC^2$ is almost a cliche. But what is matter? The more deeply we analyze its structure, the more mysterious it appears to be. In no case should we be certain of what we're talking about when we refer to what is physical. The New Testament bears witness to a transformed physicality, not to a spiritual resurrection, whatever that is.

Transformed physicality has implications for all of us whose physicality remains what it has always been. Christ's resurrection has implications for every last atom in God's universe.

Bishop Issues Pastoral Directive regarding Firearms on Diocesan & Church Property

A Charge and a Pastoral Directive - April 28, 2014

For the Clergy, Wardens and Ministry Heads of the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta

Greetings in the Name of our Risen Lord Jesus, the Prince of Peace,

Georgia Governor Nathan Deal has signed into law House Bill 60, officially called the Safe Carry Protection Act of 2014. This law is to go into effect July 1.

Given the implications of this law on our common life, I write to share a summary of the law as it pertains to our community and provide our Diocesan policy going forward.

The Safe Carry Protection Act makes it unlawful for even a licensed gun holder to carry firearms into "a place of worship, unless the governing body or authority of the place of worship permits the carrying of weapons or long guns by license holders"...

Diocesan policy

While the new law would permit churches to allow firearms in their buildings and on their property, the Diocese of Atlanta will not do so.

My judgment, charge and directive – as the ecclesiastical, or governing, authority of the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta – is that with the exception of on-duty law enforcement officers, firearms are not permitted in church buildings or on church property. Georgia law permits and enforces this policy, and it shall remain in effect in this diocese.

Furthermore, according to the law, should a license holder bring a gun into church against the wishes of the church leader, the gun owner will be fined \$100. This also means that if "a non-license holder" brings a gun to that same church, he or she will be guilty of a misdemeanor.

My judgment and this policy are based on the normative understanding of the teachings of Jesus as The Episcopal Church has received them. This matter and I hope this policy afford us yet another opportunity to live the words we pray each week.
