WIRED WORD — Wired Word meets in the **Rhodes-Wyatt room.** Each week takes an item from the news or current events and provides an opportunity to reflect on how our faith responds to or interacts with the concern through a mixture of scriptures, big questions, and discussion, "Wired Word" encourages participants to consider how following Jesus puts them in touch with the wider world.

ADULT FORUM SERIES: Rebecca Roberts will lead a five-week series called Finding Quiet in a Noisy World: Simple Practices for Busy People, which will provide an introduction to contemplative practices that can both reduce stress and deepen our connection with the Divine. Topics will include breathing for relaxation and spiritual connection, centering prayer, walking meditation, Lectio Divina, and praying with the body. The sessions will take place after the 10:00 a.m. Eucharist.

DANIEL HALL ACCESS UPDATE: Construction has moved to the side of Daniel Hall. The stairs to Daniel Hall from East First Street are being torn out, as well as the handicap ramp to the chapel. Daniel Hall is still accessible through the chapel and through the back door via the memory garden. You can still enter the chapel from East First Street using the chapel stairs. You can also access the sanctuary through the chapel. Daniel Hall (for now) can be accessed via the inside chapel stairs.

EPISCOPAL 101 Starting, Wednesday, January 14 from 5:45-7:00 p.m. in the Rhodes-Wyatt Room. Who are we as Episcopalians and how do we define ourselves? The purpose of this course is to help those who wish to engage others in matters of faith better understand who we are and how we fit into the broader Christian spectrum. This is not an advanced theology course. It does cover the basics about what the Episcopal Church teaches in terms of Jesus Christ, creeds, scripture, worship, sacraments, polity, etc. If you are an adult and you are seeking confirmation, reaffirmation, or reception into the Episcopal Church, attendance of this class is necessary. This eight week course is being given in anticipation of Bishop Keith Whitmore's visit to St. Peter's on May 3. BERRY COLLEGE TALK: On Monday, January 26, in the Berry College Ballroom at 7p.m., Dr. Charles Marsh will give an engaging talk titled: "A Christian for Our Time: Dietrich Bonhoeffer's Courageous Protest against the Nazis." Charles Marsh is a professor of religious studies at the University of Virginia and director of the Project on Lived Theology. His most recent book is Strange Glory: A Life of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, published in April 2014 by Knopf (New York). He is the author of seven previous books, including God's Long Summer: Stories of Faith and Civil Rights, which won the 1998 Grawemeyer Award in Religion. Marsh was a recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship in 2009, and the 2010 Ellen Maria Gorrissen Prize fellowship at the American Academy in Berlin. He lives in Charlottesville, Virginia. This is a free event open to the public.

CHILDREN'S CORNER- The Baptism of our Lord

At our 10:00 a.m. Eucharist, we will have baptisms. This is a cause for great celebration in the life of the wider Church and in our parish family. **All children are invited to come to the baptismal font at the church doors, so that they are able to see.** We ask that parents/grandparents wait until the clergy is in place at the font, before allowing the little ones with them to come forward.

Today in:

Children's Chapel- After reading today's gospel, the children learn about how John the Baptist brought us good news, and they also talk about people in our lives today who bring us good news.

Weaving God's Promises (classes pre-K through 6th grade) – Today, the children learn about the first people to join the ministry of Jesus. What do you think it would have been like to follow Jesus then? How can we follow Jesus now?

Rite 13- The students will discuss how we, as Christians, can grapple with stereotyping that occurs according to gender/sex.

Keeping it Real and Relevant/J2A- The students will discuss the sacraments of baptism and confirmation. We will also explore the practices of reception and reaffirmation.

Diocesan Youth Events

The only remaining New Beginnings retreat for this school year will be held, **Feb 6-8, 2015**; Registration deadline- Jan 25, 2015; team (leadership staff if you've been to New Beginnings before) application deadline: Jan 18, 2015

The only remaining Happening Retreat for this school year will be held **Feb 20-22, 2015**; Registration Deadline: Feb 8, 2015; team (leadership staff if you've been to Happening before) application deadline: Jan 30, 2015.

New Beginnings is a unique weekend especially designed to respond to the issues, concerns and needs of youth in grades 6 through 9. It was created in the Diocese of Central Florida by adults and young people to help middle school age youth grow in their love of themselves, others, and the Lord Jesus Christ. New Beginnings was introduced to the Diocese of Atlanta in 1998 with about 20 youth participants and has grown rapidly since that time. It is very common now for over 100 middle school youth to attend one weekend!

Any young person in grades 6 through 9 can attend one or more New Beginnings weekends. Participants do not have to be Episcopalian, but must be recommended through an Episcopal church and have the backing of an adult sponsor from their church who will be attending the entire weekend with the participant. It is our hope young people will return as many times as possible. Ninth graders may choose to serve on a team, provided they have already attended one weekend as a participant.

Happening is a renewal weekend, for youth in grades 10-12, sponsored by the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta, using the gifts of young people and adults from many parishes and missions. The weekend is led by teenagers for teenagers. The bottom line is that Happening exists to PRESENT CHRIST in everything we do, in everything that "happens" during the weekend and beyond that to the local parish ministries.

The Happening weekend takes place at Camp Mikell in Toccoa, GA. The high schoolers hear talks on a variety of subjects that are relevant to their lives as high school students in 21st-century America. They are assigned to Family Groups where they are able to respond to talks. The weekend is full of singing, fellowship, surprises, fun and friendship, and is designed so that individuals are given opportunities to discover more about themselves, their Lord, their families and their world.
