# DR. MARSHALL JENKINS

(FEB. 21 THROUGH MARCH 20)

### BLESSED AT THE BROKEN PLACE: RECLAIMING FAITH AND PRUPOSE WITH THE BEATITUDES

When you hurt, what does it mean for your faith? Too often church culture and religious individuals suggest that emotional pain belies lack of faith or sin against a punitive God. How ironic. For Christ suffered loneliness, misunderstanding, persecution, and death to meet us at the lowest place and lift us to hope and life with his resurrection.

When you feel depressed or anxious, unworthy or ashamed, he meets you there as a fellow struggler who offers and embodies life and hope. Reframing apparent defeat as the first step in a life of purpose, participants in this study will explore how his blessings called Beatitudes address the paradox of living through suffering on the way of joy. Based on his upcoming book of the same title, Dr. Marshall Jenkins will lead Adult Forum on the following themes from his research and writing on how the Beatitudes validate and empower faith of people in emotional pain; validate and empower faith of people in emotional pain: validation, gratitude, desire, voice, and peace. # ST. PETER'S COMMUNITY KITCHEN UPDATE

St. Peter's is known by many people in our community as the "red door church" — mostly by the hundreds of people to whom we served free lunch one week of each month at "St. Peter's Kitchen," for many years until 2014, when we began our church renovation. During those years we served thousands of meals to people in need. It has been a ministry filled with love and carried out by more than a hundred parishioners over the years.

With the completion of our renovation, we knew it was time to re-open our doors. But we began to wonder whether we should continue this ministry or look for a better way to be the hands and feet of Christ in our community. With the opening of the Rome Community Kitchen, our service became redundant. In addition, for quite a while prior to the church renovation we had found we had difficulty raising enough volunteers to staff the kitchen each month.

To everything there is a season and vestry concluded that the time had come to close our kitchen and support the efforts of the wider community at the Rome Community Kitchen. Therefore, vestry has agreed to donate \$1,500 to them in 2016. Volunteers who previously served in St. Peter's Soup Kitchen ministry have been notified by email and asked if they wish to continue volunteering to serve at the Rome Community Kitchen. Several parishioners have already volunteered to participate. This means that we will join the wider Body of Christ in shared ministry, which is a good outcome. Many in the wider community are thrilled to have us join in this ministry, especially those who run the Community Kitchen.

St. Peter's will be scheduled to serve on Friday of the third full week each month. Our first date for service at the Rome Community Kitchen is scheduled for April 22. We have been requested to send 10-12 volunteers and depending on the total number of volunteers willing to participate, it may not be necessary for everyone to work each month. We will work out a system for notifying each volunteer. We want to express a sincere "thank you" to all of the volunteers for their past service and willingness to support our "new" loving ministry of service to those in need.

We bid a sad farewell to our St. Peter's Kitchen, but we look forward to the new ministries we will now pursue.



Dear Parishioners of St. Peter's,

The participation of your fellow parishioners in the 2015 Toys for Tots campaign truly made it the most successful campaign ever. The assistance that Bob Evans and John Hine gave throughout the year was timely and of great help.

During the "Crunch Week", a group of ladies worked tirelessly to sort, select, and bag toys for the 5 and 6 year old boy group, which is the one area with the most toys. These helpful ladies were Peggy Nash, Marny Busbin, Jan Routledge, Kathy Steinbrugge, and Andye Moss.

This year we provided toys to 2,305 children in Floyd, Polk, and Chattooga counties, ranging in age from newborn through 12 years. The families were screened by social service agencies and we did our best to ensure that the families receive toys from only one charity.

We packaged batteries with all toys that needed them and inflated all sport balls to their proper pressure before they were given out. We also purchased helmets and coupled them with the bicycles, scooters, and skateboards that we received. This enabled the children to enjoy their toys as soon as they received them.

All toys and monetary donations remain in the three-county area. Everyone who does something for the campaign, from collecting, counting and sorting toys to distributing and collection the boxes, is a volunteer, so that no monetary donations go to personnel costs. We rely upon donations of time such as yours to help our volunteers. Your participation truly made a difference. **THANK YOU!**

# **Episcopal Bishops Issue A Word to the Church**

"We reject the idolatrous notion that we can ensure the safety of some by sacrificing the hopes of others."

[March 15, 2016] The <u>House of Bishops</u> of <u>The Episcopal Church</u>, meeting in retreat, unanimously approved the following Word to the Church.

A Word to the Church Holy Week 2016

"We reject the idolatrous notion that we can ensure the safety of some by sacrificing the hopes of others."

On Good Friday the ruling political forces of the day tortured and executed an innocent man. They sacrificed the weak and the blameless to protect their own status and power. On the third day Jesus was raised from the dead, revealing not only their injustice but also unmasking the lie that might makes right.

In a country still living under the shadow of the lynching tree, we are troubled by the violent forces being released by this season's political rhetoric. Americans are turning against their neighbors, particularly those on the margins of society. They seek to secure their own safety and security at the expense of others. There is legitimate reason to fear where this rhetoric and the actions arising from it might take us.


In this moment, we resemble God's children wandering in the wilderness. We, like they, are struggling to find our way. They turned from following God and worshiped a golden calf constructed from their own wealth. The current rhetoric is leading us to construct a modern false idol out of power and privilege. We reject the idolatrous notion that we can ensure the safety of some by sacrificing the hopes of others. No matter where we fall on the political spectrum, we must respect the dignity of every human being and we must seek the common good above all else.

We call for prayer for our country that a spirit of reconciliation will prevail and we will not betray our true selves.
