

Nathaniel Wilson Massey, III Aka "NAT"

I am one of those cradle Episcopalians as my father was a priest at Transfiguration in the early 70s, when I was very young. I have seen a lot of churches and I love St. Peter's more than any other. Since moving back to Rome, I have received more (spiritual growth, fellowship, love) from my involvement with St Peter's than I could ever hope to repay. My interest in serving on the vestry is a small attempt to repay that debt. I find these types of writing to be an afront to my well-honed humility.

Please forgive this transgression. I first attended St. Peter's in 1976 with my mother. Mrs. Jody Selman tells a story that during Easter service that year I apparently accosted several parishioners with an Easter bunny that I just had to take to church. As was the custom of the time, I was confirmed here in 1979. Following my graduation from Berry and as with so many, I moved away to find my fortune. Having realized that I could just as easily do that in Rome, Amy and I came back to Rome and St. Peter's in 2005. I settled into a job with F & P Georgia (We make parts for Honda, Nissan and Toyota). I am currently the Sr. Manager of HR. I have had the pleasure to be involved in a number of areas at St. Peter's. When we had such a thing, I was on the Wednesday night supper crew. I have been an acolyte since 1982. Dawn never calls me to serve any more (I may not fit in the robes). I worked on a number of Habitat for Humanity Apostles' Builds. I taught Sunday school, spoke at Adult Forum, and changed HVAC filters. I was "co-leader" of EYC for a group of kids that are now adults. I proudly served on the vestry in 2008-2010, on the search committee for John (I think we got that one right), and on Rebecca's discernment committee (a chance to work with some of the finest people that I know). Away from Church I have many hobbies. I enjoy restoring old British sports cars. I love to sail, play guitar, and play soccer (although I am very out of shape). My wife likes that I enjoy restoring furniture and cooking. All of that aside, my most favorite thing to do is to spend time with my wonderful family. My beautiful and charming wife, Amy, and I have 2 outstanding children, Wil and Megan. We also have 4 nieces and the baby of the family our Chihuahua, Lilly. Yes, she does show up in the Directory.



Brian Hampton was born in Bournemouth, England. He received a BS in economics from the London School of Economics and a MA in political science, University of Virginia. Brian was an Assistant professor in political science at Berry College

from 1971-1976. He then worked for the State of Georgia in personnel management from 1977-2007, serving in various positions including Manager of Recruitment for the State Merit System 1986-1995 and HR manager for NW Regional Hospital 1995-2007. At St. Peter's, Jacquelyn currently serves on the Altar Guild, as a Greeter, and part of a team providing meals to the homeless shelters. She was a Sunday School teacher for several years. Jacquelyn was also part of the group that accompanied Father John on the Camino de Santiago in 2017. Jacquelyn and her husband Barry are the parents of one daughter, Alicia Wright of Denver, CO.



Thanks to Lynn and Beverly Woodward for their generous gift. Dedicated to their daughters Kathleen, Emily (deceased) and Cecilia.



CHILDREN & STEWARDSHIP

Throughout October, you will hear a great deal of information about stewardship; but, what does that mean for children? For me, I believe that my relationship with St. Peter's is a two-way street. The people and experiences of St. Peter's have blessed me in so many ways, but it is also important for me to dedicate time, talent, and treasure to our church as well. Parents, you are modeling your priorities for your children. Do they see you contribute to the offertory or give of your time and talent at church? Children begin to learn what is important to you and your family from a very early age. If stewardship is important to you, intentionally include your kids in this offering.

Below are some suggestions to get you started:

- Let them see you put your offering in the plate (or let them put the offering in for you). Even if you give electronically, place the "I Give Electronically" card in the plate so they SEE you giving.
- Talk with them about tithing their time, talent, and treasure. We
 will begin having offering envelopes that are kid-friendly so they
 can fill them out and place them in the offertory plate. (These will
 be available in Children's Chapel as well)
- Consider making a family pledge on New Consecration Sunday.
 Engage in conversation about what this means for the health of the church.
- To better understand the concept of giving, we will have a candy collection bin at our All Saints' Day reception on November 3. Work with your child to count out 10% (or whatever feels right) of their Halloween candy to bring to church that morning. We will then send their donations to a worthy cause.

Consecration Sunday is coming - October 27th

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry.

For the fifth year, our parish's Vestry has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year. Vestry members Lloyd Griffin and Stephen Patton are coordinating our stewardship efforts this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat followers of Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?" During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitations to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, followed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events. Since we will make no follow up personal visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday and the parish luncheon to follow.





A BRIEF HISTORICAL TOUR

Saint Peter's Church from the Fourth Avenue entrance through the nave and sanctuary and the chapel.

Saint Peter's shield –the keys to the Kingdom of God. Upside down cross –church legend states that Peter chose to be executed in Rome by being crucified upside down as he was not worthy to die in the same way as Jesus.





Lychgate - the traditional entrance into English graveyards on church grounds

Two colors of stone on tower – when initial building funds ran out in 1896, a temporary roof was installed until 1910 funds were raised; hence, stone dug from different quarry veins.

Red front doors – red is the color of the church's patron saint, Peter's and also the color for martyrs.



Wood and glass Narthex screen - Added in 2016 renovation. Based on Gothic tracery of English choir screens.

Elaborate ceiling beams and supports- Create the feeling of a ship to carry souls through this life, thus the term for main congregational space, the Nave.


Font – elaborate marble font given by the Miss Elizabeth Noble in 1900. Memorial to Dr. John W. Gwin, MD of Philadelphia. Replaced original Caen stone font which was given to Anglo Catholic church in Virginia Highlands, Atlanta.


Tower room –now used as a meditation chapel. Once housed the baptismal font. Memorial stained-glass windows from Lyn Hovey Studios. Originally had steps from the exterior on First Street.

Needlepoint prayer kneelers – 30 years in the stitching of 64 original designs.

Good Shepherd window over front door –first window installed, Cost \$200

Ascension Window over altar - second window in stalled. Cost \$200





Original oak and brass pulpit - given by Margaret Sinclair Battey in memory of her brother. First used on inaugural Christmas Day service 1898. Later embellishments added in recent renovation. They incorporate the floral brass ornamentation from the brass posts that supported the original oak communion rail.

Lectern – in the form of an eagle, the symbol for St. John and his Gospel of the Word of God. Given by the King family as a memorial. Brass refinished in midcentury and memorial engraving added.

Organ pipes –silver surface pipes installed with the new Casavante Freres organ in 2000. New organ cost \$367,000. Original pipes were painted gold and were over the two doors flanking chancel and faced the congregation. Old pipes bought as souvenirs by congregation when organ dismantled. The new organ was one of the fruits of Don Black's rectorship.

AD GLORIAM DEI – (The Dedication of a new organ) brilliant dedication concert with guest organist, John Hosking from Truro Cathedral in Cornwall, and Wanda Cantrell performing on the excellent new organ was presented.

Communion rail – brass wheat sheaves and grapes, the Eucharistic elements. Design suggested by communion rail in St. Luke's, Peachtree Street.

The High Altar – the original altar against the wall under the Ascension window. Marble with back marble surround. New altar is an exact copy of the carvings and design. The free standing altar – replicates the original altar with same color marble and design of arches and crosses. Does not have the sacred monogram IHS.

Reredos – the elaborately shaped and carved Gothic style wooden back surround to altar. A gift to the church in 1956 by Mrs. Hugh Johnson and her sister Miss Leni O'Neill. Later that year they gave the credence tables (wall shelves) and the pair of marble pedestals for flower arrangements/ Candelabra.

Sanctuary lamp with red globe –when lighted there are consecrated elements present at the altar in the tabernacle. A sign of the movement in recent years toward more "High Church" aspects to worship.

Cornerstone – to right of pulpit at floor level. White Georgia marble contains a time capsule of items from the opening of the stone in 1992. This white Georgia marble stone was consecrated and installed by Bishop Nelson on June 28, 1892.

CHAPEL

Marble tablet of the 10 Commandments – gift of AA Cooper family. Once located in window space now part of enlarged stair to Daniel Hall.

A series of stained-glass memorial windows manufactured by Lyn Hovey Studios in Boston depicting scenes from life of St. Peter (with one exception, a window featuring St. Francis). Series installed from 1991 onward and finished by St. Peter's Day, 1992.

The Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) window behind altar. Moved from original church. Oldest window in St Peter's. A gift of the Noble family.

Altar – perhaps from original church building, but always in this chapel. Moved forward from back wall during Roger Ard's rectorship.

Carved wooden lectern in the form of an eagle is probably the one brought from original church.


1949 dedicated new altar rail, gift of family of late Rev. Mr. Hudgins and brass altar furnishings given by Miss Elizabeth Knowles in memory of her father's rectorship.

The aumbry cabinet and sanctuary lamp - Contains consecrated bread and wine for use in Eucharistic ministry outside the church building. Cabinet was originally given as a memorial gift for the Rhodes/Wyatt Room.

Brick work flanking altar indicates repairs or removal of something. Were these spaces filled with items mentioned by Miss Imogen Coulter in her "Starry Memories" paper? She mentions that during the move from the original building at First Street and Fifth Avenue, the Chancel windows and a painted pair of tablets of The Ten Commandment were brought down.

New pews and new ceiling lights were given to the chapel in early 1950's. Gifts from the chapters of St. Elizabeth, St. Margaret, and St. Monica. Later the seat cushions were added. Length of chapel reduced by one row of pews during renovation to allow new wider passage and Gothic screen.
